




Young Adult Fellowship



December 9 Alice in Wonderland by Lewis Carroll





January 13 Eleanor Oliphant is Completely Fine





March 9 The Last Lecture by Randy Pausch





May 11 Still Life with Bread Crumbs by Anna





Fellowship Tables

Fellowship Tables are a casual, "no agenda" way to gather to share a meal with friends, new and old. Interested individuals, adult couples or singles, sign up for the groups in September and October. Groups of seven to nine adults are created that meet three or more times during the program year to share a meal and fellowship in homes or restaurants. These groups are a great way to branch out, meet new people, and bond with long-time friends without a huge time commitment.

The groups are formed anew each program year, giving opportunities to meet new people. Listen for an announcement in worship to kick off the sign up period. Registration forms will be found at a table in the entry. On your registration form, you will indicate your preference to meet in homes or in restaurants. Each

group will have a volunteer organize their first meeting. Most groups will begin gathering in November. Following the first meeting, the group sets its own schedule for the remainder of the year. As the year goes on, groups may invite new members or extend their meetings into the summer.

60th Anniversary Celebration Events

On March 12, 2021, Mount Olive will be 60 years young! To celebrate that milestone we are hosting a number of fellowship events leading up to that

grand day. Our goal in hosting these events is to celebrate our congregation, raise significant funds for our mission partners, raise the profile of Mount Olive in the community, and have fun and fellowship together. The following events have already been scheduled, with more to come:

The Anniversary Celebration Kick off Potluck, June 23,2019

<u>Driving for the Dining Hall</u> – Sunday, September 22, 3:00-6:00 pm at Hadley Creek Golf Club

This event is for all ages. There is a "golf carnival" for kids, 3 years old and up; cost is \$5/child. For those who wish to golf, \$25 will get you 9 holes of golf/cart/prizes/dinner. Anyone can golf just for fun, or you may want to enter the Pastors' Challenge, wherein you may challenge the pastors in a game of golf. Winners gain bragging rights. Losers will make a donation to the Dining Hall Fund. There is also a "racehorse" component whereby non-golfers may "bet" upon any competitor(s) or pastor(s). Again, losers will make a donation the Dining Hall Fund. The Dining Hall we are raising money for is a facility that is desperately needed at the Hull High School in Kijota, Tanzania, our companion congregation. The total cost of the project is \$30,000. We wish to raise most of that with our 60th anniversary events.

Dining for the Dining Hall - Friday, November 1, 4:00-7:00 pm

This event is for the whole community – anyone who wants to attend. This is "an all hands on deck" event meant to raise significant funds for the Hull High School Dining Hall in Kijota, Tanzania. We will be hosting 4 seatings at 4:00, 5:00, 6:00, and 7:00 pm in our Fellowship Hall, serving a full Swedish Meatball Dinner. The menu is Mashed Potatoes, Meatballs and Gravy, Corn, Cranberry Relish, Lefse and Cookies. Cost is \$15/adult, \$10/child (6-12), Free (age 5 and under). This is a great opportunity for the whole congregation to be involved in service and hospitality, since many people are needed to pull this off. Everything from potato peelers and salad makers, to waitstaff and dishwashers, will be needed. What a great way to start the holidays – dining so that others may dine.

Winter Concert with former pastor, Rev. Siri Strommen

Pastor Siri served at Mount Olive from 2006 to 2012. Since then, she has continued not only as a pastor, but also as a folk musician, recording "Leaving the Garden", a solo CD, in 2019.
