Pentecost Parallels

In this global pandemic, ministry may be limited to the work of a small group of people behind closed doors; the language of worship and other programming has changed from in-person to online, amazing and perplexing many of us; and church leaders are discovering that the ripples of their ministry are traveling farther than before. As a colleague

wrote me in an email last week, "Livestream is an ongoing challenge and learning experience, but we're having fun and realizing that we're reaching a lot of people that we wouldn't with in-person worship only."

I can't think of a story with better parallels to this than the story of Pentecost. A small group of apostles in a closed room; the speaking of new languages, creating a commotion that draws an "amazed and perplexed" crowd (Acts 2:12); and a Spirit that continually pushes the Church's boundaries farther outward, from a handful of "witnesses in Jerusalem" to "the ends of the earth" (Acts 1:8). Certainly this pandemic has served as a similarly inaugural moment: the birth of the virtual Church.

We'll be observing Pentecost in our worship the weekend of May 30-31. It's an opportunity to celebrate the gifts and challenges of being the Church in this amazing time and to reflect on how all of us can continue to be witnesses "to the ends of the earth." Congregational Life

Glad You Asked!

Some members have been asking how Mount Olive is doing financially in this COVID-19 time. There is an assumption that offerings will be down since in-person worship is not possible at this time. This assumption is correct. There is some downturn in offerings, particularly offerings which we receive from guests, visitors, and occasional worshippers. Happily, Mount Olive members have come through in a big way to make up for this. We have seen an uptick in electronic giving and a number of concerned members have even given extra gifts or given their total pledge early to insure that we are in a good financial position. Thank you to everyone for all your gifts, large and small. We are in a good position at this time.

To ensure that we continue to be on steady ground financially, especially if this COVID-19 situation continues for months and months, the Church Council has recently made several decisions that give us a bit more cash flow, should we need it: **1)** We have applied for and received a loan/grant from the Small Business Administration which pays approximately 2 ½ months of payroll. If we use this money for payroll and related expenses, we will not be required to pay it back; if we use the money for anything else, it will need to be repaid. We will use it for payroll. **2)** We have inquired at our bank, Bremer Bank, about extending the term of our mortgage for 3-5 years or refinancing the mortgage, thereby creating \$3000-5000/month in additional cash flow. This money would be set aside in a dedicated line to be used only in an emergency. If it is not needed, it would be applied directly back to the principal of the mortgage.

Thank you to all who have continued to be so steady and generous in giving to Mount Olive. Because of your gifts, all of our mission partners are receiving their promised support and our staff is fully funded and going forward with confidence.

Connecting Helpers with Those in Need

All members are encouraged to be caregivers for one another in this difficult time. We know that those who have sent cards, letters, emails, and made calls to spread encouragement have been greatly appreciated. Others have offered to do



errands for people who can't get out or are afraid to do, helped set up Zoom, or sewed some masks. Mount Olive has an online sign up sheet for anyone willing to be a resource. Confessions of a Psalm Nerd

I think I know when it started. Growing up Lutheran, I sang them every Sunday. The psalms, after all, are knit into our liturgy. Create in me a clean heart... O Lord, open thou my lips... You are slow to anger, full of mercy and abounding in steadfast love...

One of the great things about being immersed in a liturgical tradition as a kid was that I knew prayers and scripture by heart before I could read. What a gift! Those seeds sprouted in me, and years later in seminary, I noticed the psalms again in a fresh way. This time, bothered by them.

That's when the Long-Term Project began.

Some of the psalms are happy, some are about wonder and awe, but *most* of them? Most of them are called laments — sad, angry songs of grief. When I learned that the scariest ones are not in the lectionary (so we don't tend to hear them in worship), I decided to get to the bottom of this. So I committed myself to be a student of these 3000-year-old songs of Israel, the prayers that Jesus prayed.

Fast forward to now. I've been immersed in the psalms eighteen years now. Along the way, against all odds, a psalmcentered vocation and career has taken shape— studying, teaching, singing and composing for the wider church. I just love it.

In these Sundays of the pandemic, I've been writing a new psalm song each week and making a song leading video for congregations like ours. The Project continues!

The psalms remain my central spiritual practice. They are a consistent partner in joy, wonder and challenge. They're not for everyone, of course, but I'm absolutely enthralled, and of this immersion, there's no end in sight.

Yep. I am a Psalm Nerd.

Reminder: Take all completed fabric masks directly to Olmsted Medical Center, Marketing and Foundation Offices, 102 Elton Hills Drive, Rochester, MN, between 8 AM and 12 PM, Monday-Friday. **We will not be collecting them at Mount Olive.** OMC inspects and sanitizes each mask before use. OMC will work with Olmsted County Public Health, Mayo Clinic, and Zumbro Valley Medical Society, among other partners and health organizations to ensure the best possible allocation of donated homemade masks, PPE, and other resources.

Since this mission began, Mount Olive volunteers, led by Elaine Monson, have sewed hundreds of masks and donated them to many places in Rochester including Olmsted Medical Center, Mayo Clinic, Assisi Heights, the Rochester Fire Station' collection for nursing home residents, Grammercy Park, Rochester YMCA, Lutheran Social Services, and more.
