Holy Communion in a Time of Exile

Dear People of Mount Olive,

As you know if you've been "attending" online worship over the last month, from the outset we have offered Holy Communion as part of worship. It seemed natural for us to do this since it is our practice to offer communion at every service as we normally gather.

What you may not be aware of, however, is that not every congregation has offered communion online as we have, and in fact some church leaders, notably ELCA Churchwide bishop, Elizabeth Eaton, have suggested that this might a good time to "fast" from Holy Communion and refrain from enjoying it until we can meet in-person once again.

An increasing number of pastors in the ELCA have now entered the discussion regarding Holy Communion in this time of online worship and the staff of Mount Olive has also entered into this discussion. We have listened both to the pros and cons regarding offering Holy Communion during this exilic time, and we offer the following thoughts regarding our practice:

- To be a community is certainly enhanced and deepened when we are physically present with one another, yet community is present "whenever two or three gather" even via screen, telephone, or by other means.
- In a time when we are absent physically from one another, the Real Presence of Christ in the sacrament becomes that much more meaningful.
- To fast is certainly commendable under certain circumstances, and if worshippers wish to fast from Holy Communion on a given Sunday, they may.
- The idea that our own kitchen table can serve as the Lord's Table only enhances Holy Communion as a gift given to us using ordinary means.
- Being invited to serve one another Holy Communion highlights our identity as a "priesthood of all believers" (I Peter 2:9), and highlights the role of the laity as worthy ministers in the Lord's service.
- Home communion offers a teaching opportunity for parents who can help children understand that communion is both "holy" (set aside for God's use), and "common" (of ordinary means). (Parents wanting additional resources may turn to this website from the author of the teaching book, *Baptized, We Live,* used at Mount Olive for communion classes: danielerlander.com)

We continue to be in dialogue about this important subject. We invite your comments and concerns and pray that this time is both a blessed and a learning time for you all.

Channel One Regional Food Bank- COVID-19 Response

Channel One is helping people facing food insecurity and poverty by taking a \$25 donation and turning it into 100 meals! The best way to help now is to make a monetary donation by clicking the "Donate Now" button on the church website. Please indicate Channel One in the "other" category. Channel One is also looking for volunteers to pack emergency food boxes and to help fill the gaps of its current volunteers who are now unavailable. If you are a healthy, low-risk individual, sign up for a shift by going to helpingfeedpeople.org, click on COVID-19 Response. Volunteers are crucial to maintaining Channel One's operations, and with many individuals practicing social distancing or self-quarantine, extra hands are needed.

Family Promise Rochester

Homeless families participating in Family Promise are currently staying in Bear Creek Apartments (instead of host churches) during the COVID-19 Pandemic. During our upcoming host week in May, volunteers will be needed to provide meals via a no-contact drop off to Bear Creek. You could team up with another family, pool money together, cook or order food. You can sign up by using the link on the Mount Olive website. You may also make a monetary donation to Family Promise via the "Donate Now" button on the church website (mention Family Promise in the comment) to help cover the added cost of rent to house up to 6 homeless families. Rent is \$2000/month

Family Service Rochester

Family Service Rochester coordinates Meals on Wheels for Olmstead County clients. As a part of their COVID-19 response, they are also offering a grocery shopping service for those that are homebound and need assistance. You may go to their website, familyservicerochester.org, for more information and to register as a volunteer. You will be contacted by e-mail when your background check has cleared. Other opportunities to volunteer including yard work, errands, and other odd jobs.

Open Table Food Truck- Zumbro Lutheran Church

Open Table is a mobile food ministry that serves a free meal every Thursday evening to guests in SE Rochester. It is a partnership between Zumbro Lutheran Church and People of Hope, but all volunteers are welcome. Food donations needed include: white rice, canned black beans, canned corn, shelf stable fruit cups, and granola bars. Donations are received at the west doors of Zumbro Lutheran on Thursday mornings. Place prepackaged food on the food cart. You may also sign up to be a volunteer for preparing or serving at: zumbrolutheran.org/mission/open-table/
Temporary volunteer restrictions: Age limit up to 65 for volunteers. Folks of any age, with chronic, moderate to

severe respiratory or cardiac disease, or diabetes are asked to refrain from signing up.

Bandage Rolling Kits Available

Bandage rolling kits to make bandages for Global Health Ministries are available in the entry at church. Follow the directions posted to check out a roller and supplies. This might

Updates from our Global Missions Partners

Jacobson, ELCA Manager for Relationships, East and Southern Africa who asked that we please continue praying for our companion synods of IELCO in Bogota, Colombia and the Central Diocese in Singida, Tanzania. In times like this, it is these gestures of accompaniment that, although they seem small, mean so much. It fosters community and brings a great sense of comfort through mutuality and intentionality. These companion relationships are critical to our witness to the love of God through Jesus Christ in the world and to strengthening our call to minister here in our country.

Please, also add prayers for ELCA mission personnel who had to make very difficult decisions whether to leave their country of service and return to the United States or stay with the people whom they serve. Each individual had to discern what is best in his or her or family situation. Some chose to remain and some returned. News from Kijota, Tanzania

Thomas Yusuph, headmaster at Hull High School in Kijota, Tanzania, sent word that all schools and university in Tanzania have been closed since the middle of March, due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Many of the students at Hull are from other towns, so they were all sent home, and each town has been closed off to outsiders. (At the time of this printing, there have not been any cases of COVID-19 reported in the state/province of Singida, where the village of Kijota and the Central Diocese of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Tanzania (ELCT) is.) Headmaster Yusush has been able to stay on campus to

allow continued construction on the new dining hall that Mount Olive has partially funded. \$26,000 of the \$30,000 needed have been raised. Thank you to everyone who had a part in this big fundraising project. We're almost to our goal with just \$4,000 to go.

News from Bogota, Colombia

Though the Mission Colombia 2020 team was unable to travel to Colombia in March, we have continued to stay in touch. The country of Colombia has only a few cases at this time. Like Minnesota, the entire country of Colombia, South America has closed down schools with a stay at home order. The 25 Lutheran Churches that make up the Lutheran Church of Colombia (IELCO) are divided into four regions, and because they cannot worship in groups, each of the four regions is taking turns each Sunday to broadcast the worship service like Mount Olive has, through the internet. They are also doing Sunday school online. They, along with the members of Kljota Parish in Tanzania, appreciated the mask pattern that was sent by a Mount Olive member, because masks are in very short supply in both these countries.
