What is this Ministry?

Community Food Response (CFR) is a volunteer led nonprofit that provides free meals to hungry people to take home or eat elsewhere. The food distributed is donated by restaurants, cafeterias, businesses and grocery stores. In addition to helping people in need, CFR helps reduce the amount of food waste generated by area businesses. CFR is excited to announce the opening of their second location in northwest Rochester located at The Exchange - 3945 10th Avenue NW, just east of Gage East Apartments. CFR North serves an average of 65 people each time they are open. Clients can visit CFR North

How do we help?

Family Promise

What is this Ministry?

Family Promise (Formerly Interfaith Hospitality Network) is a network of more than 40 faith communities that work together to provide food, shelter and loving support when a family finds themselves without shelter. More than 1,400



volunteers work within the network to provide nightly housing, meals and support. Family Promise staff provide the support and case management to assist the families as they seek sustainable employment and permanent housing. The program operates 365 days a year and can accommodate 14 people. Host churches usually house families for one week at a time. Churches that are unable to house families also supply volunteers to help serve.

How do we help?

Mount Olive hosts families four or more times during the year. Volunteers provide hospitality in the evening and overnight as they stay in our specially prepared rooms. Volunteers help by cooking and serving food, playing with the families with young children, staying overnight, or driving families to and from Mount Olive.

To Get Involved:

All volunteers must be trained with the exception of those helping with set-up and tear-down. Recertification is required every 3 years. Instead of having to go in person to update your training, you now have the option of doing your recertification online via their website at: familypromiserochester.org. Click on "Get involved" and then "Volunteer." You simply need to watch the video and fill out the form verifying that you watched it. First time volunteers must still go in-person to their training.

Upcoming hosting dates for 2018 are December 9-16, 2018. Hosting dates for 2019 have not been set.

Middle school. The Food for Friends program discreetly provides nutritious, child-friendly, easy-to-prepare food to chronically hungry children. The food is distributed in ordinary bags for students to take home over the weekends and out-of-school times.

How do we help?

Mount Olive volunteers work with Channel One to portion and distribute bags containing food each week during the school year. Last year, Mount Olive filled and delivered 35-55 bags of food each week. The food is packed on Wednesday evenings and delivered to school on Thursday to be sent home.

What is this Ministry?

Seeking to put God's love into action, Habitat for Humanity brings people together to build simple, decent, affordable housing in partnership with people in need. Families work up to 500 "sweat equity" hours building their home. Partner families purchase the house from Habitat with a no-profit mortgage. Churches and other organizations donate their time and skill to build these homes. Once in a stable home, Rochester Habitat homeowners have experienced:

- Their first family member graduating from college and improved grades at school
- Job promotions
- Improved health
- The peace of mind that comes from knowing that YOU are your own landlord

How do we help?

- We provide \$500.00/year from our budget.
- Help with the Women Build Project in the Spring.
- Volunteer at the ReStore to be a cashier or process donated items.

To Get Involved:

LSS L.I.N.K. is a transitional living program for young adults age 16-24. L.I.N.K. helps keep youth and children safe and supports their healthy development by providing:

- Early intervention and prevention services
- Supportive shelters and housing options for youth experiencing homelessness
- Services to restore and strengthen families

The goal of this program is to support at-risk youth while they establish and maintain an independent household, and prevent future occurrences of homelessness.

How do we help?

In August, a School Supply Drive was organized to collect much needed items for L.I.N.K. young adults and

What is this Ministry?

With colder weather approaching, many children will be searching their closets for winter gear and coming up short. The goal of this ministry is to help kids stay warm over the winter by providing them with appropriate gear.

How do we help?

We help by providing all types of warm winter gear: sweatshirts, coats, mittens, hats, wool socks, snow boots, and pants that are needed by our Rochester school children. Items donated to the Mount Olive Mitten tree are distributed locally to kids in need.

To Get Involved:

In November and through the Advent season, the Mitten tree will be on display in the Gathering Area. You may place gently used or new (grade school sized) coats, snow pants, snow boots, hiking boots, wool Mount Olive has 5 garden plots that were built by the Facilities and Grounds team on the east side of the building. A veggie trough was built for those who have a love for gardening, but have difficulty bending over. Each spring and fall, the garden crew decides what type of vegetables to plant during the growing season and together, the planting takes place. Last year, over 200 pounds of produce grew and was donated. By mid-August 2018, about 75 pounds of produce had been donated to Community Food Response. A few new crops were planted this year including sweet corn and sweet potatoes. This years garden crew is: Carrie, Jacob, Samantha, Joshua, and Jeremiah Fletcher, Lori Kuhlmann-Leibfried and Bob Liedtke.

How can you help?

You and your family are encouraged to come, get your hands dirty and deepen your faith in the goodness of the earth! Many volunteers are needed to plant, weed, water, and harvest the vegetables.

What is this Ministry?

Mount Olive has a special relationship with our neighborhood school, Elton Hills Elementary. We have provided low income students with dozens of coats, boots, gloves, and other items they need. We also are active in the Reading Buddy program which matches our members with children who need extra help. We sponsor a staff appreciation effort during the school year to remind the faculty and staff how much we appreciate their work. During Elton Hills Summer School 2018, Mount Olive volunteers conducted miniclasses on arts, crafts, poetry, and games.

How do we help?

When the school calls with a need, we gather supplies. When the time comes to sign up Reading Buddies, we get the word out. You can also donate clothing, shoes and other items by placing it in the NP Community collection bin in the Mount Olive parking lot. All proceeds from this go to Next Chapter. Mount Olive members attend the Next Chapter banquet and donate funds to support their ministries.

What is this Ministry?

How do we help?

Volunteers spread Christmas cheer while helping to raise money that will make a difference in the lives of people in crisis for food and housing programs, after-school activities for at-risk kids, and more. During God's work. Our hands. Sunday Mount Olive members made 300 sandwiches for their lunch program. And Mount Olive has an ongoing collection of hotel sized toiletries which are donated to the SA.

Since most of the churches of IELCO are within the city limits of Bogota and the synod office is there, we were able to learn much about this small, but determined group



of God's people. What a delight they are! Their hospitality is overwhelming! In conjunction with the leadership of IELCO we developed a covenantal agreement between IELCO and Mount Olive congregation, which was approved by the Mount Olive Church Council, the ELCA Global Mission Group, the Southeast Minnesota Synod, and the bishop and executive committee of IELCO. This agreement provides goals and structure for ongoing communication, visits, prayer, financial support and education. In the last year we have had the pleas-

During the Kline's visit in July 2018, Mount Olive hosted a Colombia workshop titled "Building Peace from the Ground Up." It was a fun, interactive and informative event. How do we help?

This is a much celebrated gift at the school since a major need for them is access to the latest educational materials and teachers. Mark Masbruch, who travelled to Tanzania in 2007 and 2011 and is on the 2018 team, currently serves on the Tanzania Operations Team (TOT) of the SEMN synod. Traveling to Tanzania this fall will help identify projects there that Mount Olive can support.

ELCA World Hunger

What is this Ministry?

By providing immediate relief to those who are hungry, ELCA World Hunger meets basic needs and recognizes the universal human right to food. They work to connect people with the resources they need to produce food and gain access to clean water, education, health care, and sources of income so that long-term, sustainable change can be accomplished.

How do we help?

Mount Olive supports ELCA World Hunger in a variety of ways. Proceeds from soup suppers during Lent, special offerings, supporting God's Global Barnyard, and making purchases from the Good Gifts catalog all support ELCA World hunger and it's partners to help make it possible for the ELCA to respond, supporting sustainable solutions that get at the root causes of hunger and poverty.

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Lutheran World Relief (LWR) is a non-profit organization that works with local partners to provide lasting solutions to poverty, injustice, and human suffering.

How do we help?

Mount Olive supports LWR by sponsoring:

- Baby Care Kits-We have a long history of our Sunday School Youth assembling the Baby Care Kits. Again, the supplies are provided by the congregation and kits are assembled between services. After a blessing during worship, they are sent to the LWR warehouse in the Twin Cities to be shipped overseas.
- **Personal Care Kits**-For the past few years, from the supplies provided by the congregation during promotion time, our youth assemble the kits. After a blessing during worship, they are sent to the LWR warehouse in the Twin Cities to be shipped overseas.
- Quilts-Quilts not only provide comfort, but also provide an object that is useful in imaginative ways including a baby carrier, a sunshade, a shawl and most importantly a constant reminder that someone far away cares a lot. (For more information on quilts, see page 14.)
- LWR Coffee Project-Fair Trade coffee offers a fair, just, and equitable marketplace for small-scale farmers around the world. Fair Trade coffee is served on Sunday morning and is available for purchase in the gathering area.

To get involved:

- **Donate** items as needed for the kits or fabric and thread for the quilters. Monetary donations are also used to buy batting in bulk.
- Quilters meet weekly on Thursday mornings at 9:00 am to assemble and tie quilts and sew the bindings. No sewing experience is required to participate.
- **Sewing** at home: Quilt top packages, baby jackets, and blankets can be picked up in the Gathering Area cabinets. Return completed items to the LWR cabinet in the Gathering Area. If you are a knitter, check with Cathy Hanson (contact information above) about knitting baby hats to go with hoodless jackets that are made.
- **Project Comfort:** In June or July a weekend is designated for "Project Comfort". Donations made during this weekend are sent to LWR to help pay for shipping all of the quilts and kits overseas. Current shipping costs are: one quilt-\$2.25, one Personal Care Kit-\$2.65, one Baby Care Kit-\$1.30. A gift of \$100 will ship 44 quilts or 37 Personal Care Kits or 76 Baby Care Kits. In 2017, enough funds were raised to cover all of the shipping costs for the quilts and kits made at Mount Olive.
- **Sponsor** Sunday morning coffee in celebration of a birthday or special occasion for only \$15.00.
- **Visit** the Lutheran World Relief website, lwr.org, to learn more about the projects listed above and to gain access to planning resources and information about all of their programming.





For over 25 years, the Mount Olive Quilters have met to make large (full size) and small (baby) quilts. This group meets 9:00-11:00 a.m. every Thursday throughout the year. Annually they make 75-100 large guilts and the same number of baby guilts, which are donated to Lutheran World Relief, The Rochester Women's Shelter, Colombia, NAMI, Families First Crisis Nursery, etc. In addition, guilts and quilted items are donated to the Good Earth Village Auction each year which provides scholarships for children going to camp. Prayer Shawls

For more than 10 years, Mount Olive members have been meeting to pray and knit or crochet prayer shawls.

Many knit throughout the year to create these beautiful shawls that give comfort to those who have been ill, grieving, or experiencing a difficult time of life. The shawls are not just for Mount Olive members, but are available to anyone who is in need of prayer and comfort. There are also shawls for children and blankets for babies.
